Idaho State University is home to the country's first covered football stadium built on a college campus. Holt Arena, affectionately known as the mini-dome, seats close to 12,000. This allows plenty of room for spectators at events like the Simplot Games (the country's largest indoor, high-school track meet, pictured below), and USA Wrestling's West Kids & Cadet Regional Championships (with 1900 competitors).



Seated on 160 acres, the Bannock County Fairgrounds offer exhibit buildings, soccer fields, a race track, a rodeo arena and grandstand with a capacity of 3500, a moto-X track, 3 smaller arenas, and horse stalls.

The Portneuf Wellness Complex is an 80-acre multi-use, multi element, world class complex. The ongoing project will feature many multi-use fields, outdoor volleyball and basketball courts, walkways, an urban fishing pond and an amphitheater to seat 11,000 for concerts and other outdoor events.

The Pocatello-Chubbuck Auditorium District is building a 40,000 sq. ft. multi-purpose event center focused on youth sporting events. The floorplan includes an indoor 3-court gymnasium for volleyball, basketball and other sports, seating for 2,000, team rooms, and concession stands. It will also be used for tradeshows, RV and boat shows, dance and cheer competitions, enthusiast groups, concerts, and similar events. The space provides a venue for entertainment and events for the community, as well as the entire region.

of Idaho State University. A hands-on area is also featured where kids can see and touch ancient fossil shells.

Pocatello is next door to the Fort Hall Indian Reservation where the Shoshone-Bannock Tribal Museum offers

a compelling view of Native American history and culture. Every August, the impressive Shoshone Bannock Indian Festival draws over 2,500 dancers from throughout North America. The gathering is a

visual delight, transporting attendees back to another time and place. Spectators are encouraged to attend.



The Port-neuf Muzzleloader's Mountain Man Rendezvous replicates an 1840's celebration each spring. Cannon and black powder demonstrations and canvas tents and teepees set the stage for an exciting weekend.



First visited by foot, then wagon, then railroad, and now by cars and airplanes, Pocatello continues to serve as a gateway to the intermountain West, thus earning it the nickname of the "Gate City." Oregon Trail pioneers who passed through our gates could travel north to Oregon or south to California. Expansion of the Union Pacific Railroad injected flavor to the town and has added significantly to its prosperity. Potato and wheat farmers, ranchers, businessmen, industrialists, and Idaho State University also contribute to the rich texture of Pocatello and neighboring Chubbuck. Today the nearby junction of I-15 and I-86



provides flexibility to modern day adventurers. Pocatello is uniquely positioned at a central point between some of the nation's greatest playgrounds. The city is within a few hours drive of Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks, and equally close to world renowned ski areas like Jackson Hole, Wyoming, Park City, Utah and Sun Valley, Idaho.



Amazing outdoor recreation and scenic beauty grace the area. Worldclass mountain bike trails, challenging rock-climbing, golf courses and an active Greenway are some of the offerings located right in Pocatello.

Our valley is surrounded by mountains laced with incredible trails that support outdoor enthusiasts at every level of conditioning and experience. The best part is, they are just minutes away. You'll find everything from heart-pounding mountain bike rides to relaxing nature walks. The



of maintained trails for hikers and bikers on the doorstep of the west bench. The Portneuf Greenway trails run through the city for thirteen miles along the Portneuf River and lead to public land trailheads that surround the city.

Rock-climbers often travel to Pocatel-

lo just to scale the "Shady side" and "Sunny side" of the basalt lava cliffs of Ross Park right in the city. The "Pocatello Pump," the nation's oldest rock-climbing competition, takes place here each September.

Golfers have no trouble finding a beautifully groomed course to challenge their game—sunny Pocatello is home to two, 18-hole public courses and one private membership course. Try your arm at disc golf at either the grassy or sagebrush covered courses. Sports fans and athletic competitors alike find the Pocatello area offers a healthy quality of life with great athletic clubs, over 40 tennis courts, local sports leagues,

and large running, bicycling and skiing communities. Many events are offered throughout the year including a summer fun-run series, the Pocatello Marathon—a Boston marathon qualifier, the Scout Mountain Ultra Trail—a 50-mile course, the Southeast Idaho Senior Games as well as bike and ski races.

Idaho is known as a hunting and fishing paradise, Southeast Idahoans may fish year-round from the finest mountain lakes, rivers, and crystal clear trout streams. Bird, upland game and big game hunting

are a sportsman's delight in the surrounding backcountry.

If you're arriving on the Polar Express, you'll find the same incredible mountains, trails, and meadows covered in snow and ready to provide cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, or snowmobile adventures Idaho-style! The East Fork Mink Creek Nordic

Center hosts about 20k of groomed skate and classic ski trails, as well as separate snowshoe trails. The Mink Creek Park N' Ski Idaho State Park program offers an additional 29km on five trails. Trips to the yurt system are also popular with hearty winter lovers. Groomed snowmobile trails loop Scout Mountain, Garden Creek, and South Mink Creek for miles of powder and mountain trails with fresh Idaho air. Pebble Creek provides all the downhill or snowboarding ecstasy you can absorb. After an invigorating outing covering 2,200 vertical feet per run and jumps, rails, boxes and rollers at three terrain parks, you can be back in town for dinner in less than 20 minutes.





Learn to squeegee at the world's one-and-only Museum of Clean, explore the world's largest collection of vacuum devices and take a selfie with the world's first motor-driven horse-drawn vacuum. Washers, chimney sweeps, a giant ark, kid's clean world and more fill this 75,000 sq. ft. LEED's certified facility.

Ross Park, the city's largest park, is home to the Pocatello Aquatic Center and the Pocatello Zoo. Float the lazy river at the Pocatello Aquatic Center, ride the water slide, or let young kids splash in the zero-depth pool where they can safely play, slide, and even crawl



through tunnels. See Cougars, Bison, Elk and the other native species of Yellowstone and the Rocky Mountains up-close at the Pocatello Zoo. Visit the Grizzly for dinner as he fishes his stream in the unique Grizzly Habitat. Ross Park's upper level houses the Bannock County Historical Museum, Pioneer Village, a disc-golf course, a Veteran's Memorial and the Fort Hall Replica. Step into the outdoors at the Edson Fichter Nature Area along the Portneuf Greenway. The community fishing pond and swimming hole are perfect for a summer's picnic. Pocatello has 32 parks, many with picnic and playground areas and covered pavilions.

Enjoy strolling through the historic architecture in Old Town Pocatello. Each first Friday of the month join an Art Walk and meander through Old Town's art galleries, antique stores and shops to the tune of local musicians. Partake of tasty produce at the Portneuf Valley Farmer's Market during summer months.
